Orloff to Serve on Solid and Hazardous Waste Commission

"Alek fits perfectly because of his in-depth knowledge of environmental compliance."

Orloff will serve as an interim appointee pending State Senate confirmation hearings in January. Appointees to the State's Solid and Hazardous Waste Commission serve three-year terms.
